

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Dates for your Diary

Hazel Bailey 1934 - 2010

In 1979 I decided to hold an open day in the belfry of St. Mark's, Jersey principally for the benefit of potential learners for the new ring of bells due to be installed at St. John. During the course of the afternoon a lady appeared who had no connection with St. John and stated that she had learned to ring as a young girl. I invited her to catch hold, standing by in case of mishap, but my help was not needed as Hazel - for it was she who had appeared - handled her bell well with clear evidence of having been well-taught.

As a result she joined the St. Mark's band and remained a most loyal member for the next 31 years until her death.

Although she had been taught to handle a bell, including raising and lowering she had no knowledge of change-ringing. Her fairly quick mastery of plain hunting enabled her to ring her first quarter on the Treble before the end of August. The mastery of method ringing on a working bell proved a more difficult task, but with the perseverance that was a hallmark of all she undertook, she eventually managed a quarter peal of Grandsire Doubles (3rds observation throughout) by the end of the next year, with husband Jim whom she had introduced to ringing, achieving his first quarter on the Treble on the same occasion. She eventually introduced their son Marc to ringing and the three of them rang in several quarters together.

Unfortunately Hazel had her own unique way of learning methods which I never understood and which made mastery of new methods a very slow process. Plain hunting presented no problems and she quickly rang a quarter of Bob Triples on the Treble at St. John. Mastery of Plain Bob, both Doubles and Minor and Grandsire Doubles followed and finally Stedman Doubles which became, I always felt, her favorite method and in which she became a very safe ringer. Both she and Jim became stalwart members of St. Mark's and their attendance on Sunday mornings was, over the years, a great support to the church.

It took Hazel a very long time to master Cambridge Surprise but having done so she quickly mastered Beverley also. The achievement of which I think she was the most proud was joining the band of six or seven St. Marks ringers who rang quarter peals inside to all the (42) standard Surprise minor methods (the more so as she got there before I did). A lot of credit for this goes to Simon Linford.

Probably her greatest contribution to quarter-peal ringing at St. Mark's - and her last and 417th quarter there was in March 2009 - was as a very reliable Treble ringer. She circled the tower to quarters and was also Tower Captain for a spell of three years.

She was a member of the winning St. Mark's team on several occasions in the annual striking competition.

She and Jim became very enthusiastic ringing tourists and as leisure time made it possible together they rang all over

Great Britain, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand, Canada and on all the rings of bells in the USA.

Hazel died on 20th June after a very long illness. The ground-breaking treatment which she received meant frequent and tiring air travel to London but she never complained. The end, when it came, was very quick and she was in palliative care at Jersey Hospice for but a few days, so much so that her death came to most of us as something of a shock.

We were very sad to have lost the half-muffled quarter of Stedman Doubles on the day following Hazel's death but are pleased to have rung a quarter of Cambridge in celebration of her life on the evening of her funeral which was well attended by ringers past and present.

Our thoughts and prayers have constantly been with and for Jim and Marc at his time of their great loss.

November 19/20/21st 2010 Training Weekend in Reading

For the third year running I am arranging a training weekend in Reading. The format of the weekend is now well established. For an account of 2009 training please see Feb 2010 Les Cloches.

Itinerary:

Arrive Reading train station lunchtime on Friday afternoon (Nov 19th), check in to Reading Central Premier Inn . (not Travel Lodge as previous years) Walk to St Giles. Ring at St Giles 3pm – 5pm with support from Reading ringers. Chinese takeaway/casserole at home of local ringer.

Saturday morning – divide into groups, collected from accommodation, ring all day with support from Reading ringers. Attend a branch practice, supper at home of a local ringer.

Sunday morning service ringing in 2 town centre churches, café for lunch and a chance for some 12 bell ringing supported by local ringers on very well soundproofed peal of 12 at St Lawrence's (also in town centre). Mid afternoon train approx 2.30pm — arrive back in S'ton at approx 3.45 for 5pm flights home.

The groups will be fine tuned when I know who is coming. What I am hoping for is:

- Helen McG, Group A, Plain hunt and Bob Doubles.
 Probably at Shinfield Church
- Peter B, Group B, Interesting minor and plain triples and major eg Kent, Oxford Minor & Grandsire triples and Plain bob major. Probably at St Michaels Tilehurst
- Stephen Rossiter, Group C, Stedman triples, DNCBM and Surprise major. Probably at Shiplake

Obviously there may be overlap with methods but I am sure you get the idea.

<u>Cost:</u> Flights to and from Southampton, train to and from Reading, accommodation in Reading Central Premier Inn (Note this year we are in Premier Inn NOT travel Lodge as previously) currently £39 per night for double/twin room. 2 evenings of casserole/Chinese at Jenny's and tower donations.

Tips for calling Call Changes

- Calls must be easily loud enough for the deafest person in the band to hear easily. Speak clearly – what is the point of mumbling? It just causes confusion and the band experiences a lack of confidence.
- 2. You must only swap bells which are adjacent in the current change
- 3. Calls must be made at the handstroke of the 2 bells you are swapping. The ringers will give effect to your call at the following handstroke ie they get a whole pulls notice of the change.
- 4. You must either call the bells UP in the change or DOWN. It will be confusing to everyone if you call some changes up & some down. From rounds 1,2,3,4,5,6 to achieve 1,3,2,4,5,6 you can call the bells UP by calling 2 to 3, or call the bells down by calling 3 to 1. Either way is fine but please be consistent.
- 5. Have a clear goal in mind ie know where you are heading. There are a number of well recognised musical changes to aim for:

QUEENS: all the odd numbers then the even numbers eg 1,3,5,2,4,6,

<u>TITTUMS</u>: imagine dividing the rounds in half, then have the first bell of the first half followed by the first bell of the second half then the second bell of the first half followed by the second bell of the second half, then the third bell of the first half is followed by the third bell of the second half eg 1,5,2,6,3,7,4,8

This sounds wonderful when struck well but tends to be 'lumpy' if rung by an inexperienced band as you have (by definition) a little bell then a big bell then a big bell etc.

If attempting this then it may be worth reminding the ringers that the big bells must keep close to the little bells and the little bells must give the big bells a decent space. Encourage the ringers to LISTEN to the change.

<u>REVERSE ROUNDS</u>: 6,5,4,3,2,1 – can have some lumpy moments when the treble is no longer leading & the tenor is called down from the back – not recommended for inexperienced band

Variations of reverse rounds: 5,4,3,2,1,6 (advantage = keeps tenor at the back) or better still 1,5,4,3,2,6 ie the 'inside' bells are in reverse order but the 1 & 6 are 'at home' – this is good for inexperienced bands (put your best ringer on the 5 – they have the hardest job , being a big bell called to follow the smallest bell)

6. When calling any changes have in mind the abilities of your band. HORSES FOR COURSES. There is no point in calling something hugely complicated if you have some ringers who are barely steady in rounds. If you have an experienced band then let your imagination run wild

Roller coaster: 1,4,3,2,7,6,5,8

Jokers: 1,7,6,5,4,3,2,8

Whittington's: 5,3,1,2,4,6 or 1,2,7,5,3,4,6,8

As with all ringing – time spent writing it out will pay dividends.

20th March 2010 in Jersey

We rang handbells, enjoyed a Lent Lunch in the village school and generally had a great day out.

Huge thanks to everyone on Jersey. It is a pleasure to be Master of a District where everyone is so welcoming. HMMcG



The Restoration and Augmentation of Forest Bells 1984

It is difficult to comprehend that it is already 25 years since the Forest Bells were restored and augmented from four to six by the Whitechapel Bell Foundry, London. The previous major work had been undertaken in the 1890's when the then three bells were rehung in a new oak frame and the cracked 1685 Tenor was recast by John Warner's Cripplegate Bell Foundry who also cast a new Treble to make the bells up to four. By the 1960's however the ironwork supporting the bells was thought to be in a poor condition, and it seems at that time there was neither the will or the financial resources to do very much about it. And so it remained until the mid 1970's when a family group of bell ringers from Oxford visited the Church and were able to inspect the bells. They found that although some of the ironwork was indeed somewhat corroded, the main problem appeared to be one of the bells loose on its headstock and in need of tightening. This was achieved and the bearings and frictional parts checked and low and behold the four bells were again able to be rung 'full circle' as was intended.

So the bells were rung for the next ten years as a 'Four' and indeed a good few quarter peals were rung on them in this period. We were mindful of the fact that the ironwork was somewhat corroded and that plain bronze bearings rather made for heavy going. The bells would need professional attention sooner rather than later, but how to go about it. Although the maintenance of the Clock and Bells is Parish responsibility under the Remède, it seemed desirable to be able to go one better than just to rehang, in fact various quotes for a rehang had been proposed over the years, but none taken up.

It was Michael Hilson who originally suggested that there might well be enough space beneath the existing oak frame to at least house another bell, and if one, then why not two to make the peal to six. I then consulted Mr William Hughes of Whitechapel Bell Foundry and suggested that such an augmentation may be possible. He suggested that I measure and survey the area beneath the frame and sent him a sketch of the proposal. As it happens Whitechapel were doing work at Torteval Church at the time, and their bell hanger Philip Jakeman visited the church and took his own measurements. When we found that they agreed with my figures to within a quarter of an inch we realized that the scheme would indeed be possible – with certain provisos, not least that the church would need a new ceiling below the bells.

Within a short while Whitechapel Foundry produced a set of proposals and a breakdown for the works to be undertaken as two jobs, but priced to be undertaken both at the same time. This consisted of the work to modify the four existing bells, retune them and rehang them with new metal headstocks and with ball race gudgeon bearings i.e. up to date practice. The second part would be to cast and supply two new Treble Bells tuned to match the existing bells — as retuned and to supply all new fittings etc. The proposal was put to the Parish for them to fund the first part on the Remède, whilst the Church would find the approx £5,500 for the new bells. It was of course important that the whole job was completed as

one.

With a certain amount of negotiation the Parish accepted the scheme at face value and we set out to raise the balance for the two new bells. Within 10 months somehow – I am still amazed, the money was forthcoming and at the end of October the bells were returned from the foundry with all the fittings. I was able to work with Philip Jakeman both in the removal and the reinstallation. Certainly it was a most fascinating experience, and we remarked at the time that two of the bells date from 1685, two from the 1890's and two now from 1984. This was I think a very good way to celebrate the tercentenary of the 1685 bells, they are now the 4th and 5th of an excellent ring of six bells.




We have been promised an autumn visit from the Guides and maybe other societies on the Island will now also think to come to us for an interesting evening event.

Alderney Bob Doubles


It all began with an innocent observation in the pub. Philippa reminisced that she had once rung Woughton-on-the-Green bob doubles for a striking competition that was held at the



eponymous church. "That gave the judges something to think about!" As a band we had recently begun ringing some simple variations - April Day, Southrepps, Kennington - that sort of thing. A lot of novelty for little actual learning. So I thought it would be fun to ring a variation of Woughton and name it Alderney. On checking the blue line I could see why almost no variations have been rung. It is a twin hunt method (1 and 3 hunt), but the 3 rings wrong places. A wrong place in 3rds, . A wrong place in 2nds, . A wrong place at lead, . A wrong place in 2nds, and then 4 blows, still wrong, across the lead end. Nasty! 2nd and 5th place

bells have the pleasure of three blows at lead and a 4/5 dodge at the lead end. 4th place bell, the pivot, is a breeze by comparison, thought the 3 blows behind is a little unusual. Plain courses, though, went well and although I had produced some extents with the standard bob and single that go with Woughton, I couldn't wait to try a touch with the shatter single.

The shatter single is a nasty asymmetric single. The sole redeeming aspect is that by using it, only the one call is required to produce an extent of Woughton. Fancifully I thought that with just the one call our task would be simple. A plain course of only 30 changes; two bells hunting; one call; what could be simpler? Well we soon found that a lot of things were simpler! For a start, going in and out of the hunt was interesting. But there were bags of enthusiasm and most members of the band took part in the project over a few practice nights. Finally we selected six who both knew the line and happened to be available on a Wednesday evening to ring a few extents in order to name the variation. After a couple of false starts we settled town to some very confident ringing where everything slotted into place. It may be a while before we ring a peal of it, but hopefully it will appear from time to time on our practice night.

The Forest Church Clock

The Forest Church Clock was installed in 1897 as part of the parochial celebration of Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee. The project was funded by public subscription although I understand that Dr Le Pelley gave a generous donation to see the project through. Initially Bensons of London were invited to furnish a new tower clock.

On surveying the tower, now with the four bells installed they came to the conclusion that there would not be a sufficient weight drop to allow the clock to operate for more than one day with the type of movement that they could provide.

However a German Clockmaker who had started in business was contacted to see what could be done. This was Mr. Ernst W Bachmann – who's Company we later knew as The Jewellers & Silversmiths (now Mappin & Webb) in Commercial Arcade.

Mr. Bachmann was evidently well familiar with tower clocks from Germany and was able to come up with a fairly unique solution.

His two weights, one much larger and heavier than the other driving the Striker, the smaller driving the clock, drop into a weight well on the north-east corner of the tower. It is however not possible for them to drop all the way down without fouling part of the bell frame, so they installed a slightly slanted greased board, allowing the weights to slide all the way to the bottom without fouling.

The clock remained in its original form, really with minimal maintenance, even when the bells were augmented from four to six in 1984.

It was only recently that the mechanism has been fitted with modern electric winding apparatus that any really significant alteration has been made, and even now the clock is only electrically wound, and is theoretically immune from being stopped and otherwise affected by power interruptions. It still however has to be manually regulated as it gains a little in the Winter and loses a little in the summer.

The following photo shows the clock mechanism from the front with the two setting dials.

The white dial on the right side shows minutes i.e. the position of the minute hand on the clock face whilst the larger wheel on the left shows hours and is part of the striking mechanism. The clock strikes the hours and half hours.

The only 10 bell tower we visited on Saturday (Fareham) had such an odd struck 7th bell that it was necessary to ring it ahead of the 6 on both strokes to get the rounds to sound acceptable – a real lesson in odd-struckedness!!

Service ringing saw us at the glorious heavy 10 of St Mary's, then the light 12 at Bitterne Park and finally the very small 6 of St Barnabus.

Jo's parents had done a terrific job reconnoitring lunch which was the perfect conclusion to the weekend. Glorious weather, great company, pretty countryside, Stephen Rossiter at the wheel of the transport – who could want for more?

The Carillon at University of California, Berkeley

A little history.....



n March of 1914, Leon J. Richardson of the Latin department and Chairman of the Committee on Chimes, wrote to the John Taylor Bell foundry to inquire about procuring bells for the University.

It was decided that twelve bells would be cast to be played from a large keyboard with twelve wooden pump-handles. The largest bell weighed 4118 pounds and struck the C below middle C. All twelve original bells bear the inscription "Gift of Jane K. Sather 1914."

Because of delays caused by World War I, the bells were finally shipped on the English Ship Senator, arriving in San Francisco in April of 1917 where they were hung in a circle from the ornate ceiling of the observation level of Sather Tower on the campus of the University of California, Berkeley.

The bells were first played on November 3, 1917 at 2 pm by George Williams Clark, a senior from Los Angeles. From the outset, it was clear that there were not enough bells to play many songs, including the Star-Spangled Banner. The original chime was transformed into a full carillon by the generous 50th Anniversary Gift to the University by the Class of 1928. These additional thirty-six bells were cast by the Paccard Foundry of Annecy, France.

In 1983, Evelyn and Jerry Chambers added thirteen more Paccard bells, making the carillon a sixty-one bell, concert pitch instrument, fully chromatic from low G to the g five octaves above. The transmission was installed by the I.T. Verdin company of Cincinnati, Ohio. The playing keyboard was designed and built by Richard P. Strauss.

The Chambers' gift also provides for a Carillon Festival to be held every fifth anniversary year of the Class of 1928 in its honour, a campanology library, practice rooms and practice keyboards, and an endowed position for the University Carillonist.

The carillon program at Berkeley has several constituent parts. The most prominent part is, of course, performance, with thrice daily performances on the carillon an integral part of campus life.

There is also an extensive instructional programme and, under the umbrella of the Berkeley Carillon Institute, a library of photographs, music, manuscripts, books and articles, and the publication of carillon music. Berkeley carillon students have also formed the Berkeley Carillon Guild, funded through the ASUC, which provides substantial campus outreach, including the DeCal class "Learning to Play the Sather Tower Carillon."



The carillon is played from a large keyboard containing both manual and pedal keys, similar in design to an organ but much larger. A carillon is very sensitive to the touch of the player, and has the largest dynamic range of any acoustical instrument. The keyboard is linked to the clapper of the bell by a manual transmission mechanism that allows the player great expressive range.

The Guild AGM

Climbing up to the ringing chamber to sample the recently augmented bells at Herriard St Mary, involves the navigation of 3 ladders, so it's certainly not a tower for the faint — hearted. The ring consists of three Medieval bells, two bells obtained from the Keltek trust, and a newly cast one, the work being supported by the Guild BRF.

The bells were dedicated in March this year, and considering their "newness" one might have expected a large crowd of ringers to turn up to sample the bells when they were available as the first of three towers open for the Guild AGM in July. However, this wasn't the case – there were in fact only 8 ringers present during the allotted time, and 3 of these were from the C.I. District!

Despite a mix of bells, the peal makes up a nice enough 6, although they were rather loud inside the tower, and seemed to be a bit harder work than one might expect from a 7cwt tenor.

The next tower available was Odiham All Saints. The local ringers here must all be dwarfs as the tail ends were exceedingly long, even for someone of such fairly short stature as myself!

This is a ground floor 12cwt ring of 6 with a long draught, so not the easiest bells to handle. However, they "go" reasonably well, but don't sound that inspiring.

The last tower was Basingstoke, St Michael. The first floor ringing chamber is accessed from a spiral staircase, which we eventually found an outside door to, after looking for a way in inside the church! The interior of the belfry gives off an air of an "old established" ringing chamber where ghosts of former ringers probably lurk to give a critical ear to the striking! There was a noticeable wobble of the tower walls during ringing here, but this didn't deter me from enjoying some Grandsire and Stedman triples. Unfortunately I didn't hear these bells outside, but they seemed to have a reasonable sound from indoors and went well.

Next on the agenda was a short service (Mike Bubb and I approved of the hymns, especially the Ringers' hymn set to the "proper" tune!)

The AGM followed in the adjacent "Glebe Hall", appropriately decorated with bell shaped flower arrangements. Details of the meeting can be seen on the Guild website. However, a few items are noted below:-

- David Strong and Mike Bubb were re-elected as Guild Master and Guild Hon General treasurer respectively.
- The previously-vacant post of Vice-Master was filled by Mike Till. Clare Griffiths from the Isle of Wight is

the new Guild Hon General Secretary.

proposed increase of subscriptions was approved.
 This will result in a £2.50 increase on all types of membership except probationary membership, and will be used in its entirety as a levy for the Bell Restoration Fund.

There were just 3 entries in the 8 bell striking competition held at Bramley that morning. It was won by the Christchurch and Southampton District. (This competition will be an item on the agenda of our district AGM in September.)

Unfortunately I had to leave the meeting early so that I had time to catch my train back to the airport, so I cannot report on the tea — which promised to be a good one! It was good to be involved in a Guild event. I would encourage others to attend if they have the opportunity.

ALDERNEY TOWER REPORT

Alderney ringers have had a busy first half of 2010 with strong attendance of the District outing in May and as hosts to the District Spring Meeting in April. A visit in June by our old friends the Reading ringers enabled a Smörgåsbord of ringing which included two quarters of Alderney Treble Place Minor and several firsts. Some of the Reading ringers stayed with us a few days, making a day trip to Guernsey for peals rather than staying in Guernsey and only making a day trip to Alderney. We approve!

In May, we hosted a visit from the Alderney Brownies, perhaps sowing seeds that will germinate later. We continue to harbour an ambition to involve young people in the band.

Our focus is to provide quality ringing for services and festivals and we have achieved that objective. The band remain numerically strong and the range of methods tackled in the first half of the year continues to build upon a foundation of regular practises on Monday night and Saturday morning. We also introduced in March a regular one hour slot on Wednesday evenings where a selected band can ring longer touches of a special method to improve striking, steady ringing and the quality of conducting (perhaps our weakest asset). This should leave us able to focus more on the needs of our less experienced ringers on practice night.

In the first six months of the year we welcomed 10 visitors and rang nine quarters (four doubles, 5 minor). These included Victoria McAllister and Keith Salmon's first quarters, Ann Wheeler's first inside to Grandsire, and Pam Pearson's first inside to Plain Bob, Treble Bob and Surprise Minor (all in a space of 24 hours!)

Going forward we are optimistic that gentle progress continues. On a practice night we are able to fire out an ever increasing repertoire. Methods which last year we could fire out in the plain course we can now fire out in a touch. Ringers who last year could go wrong in call changes, can now go wrong whilst plain hunting. Fate smiles upon us indeed. Like watching a tree grow. You cannot actually see the change day to day But each year as it comes into leaf you realise that it is greater than it was. A Ringing Master needs no more than this.

Sue and I have also planned a ringing outing to Oxford in October.
