Off to St Peter's for general ringing – Judith covered for Stedman triples (well done Judith.) and we rang lots of plain courses of Bob triples, a good touch of DNCBM, courses of both Yorkshire and Guernsey S Major and plain hunting on 7 & 8. Sadly the qtr of Bob Royal was unsuccessful.

In the afternoon the general ringing at Town Church was a wonderful mix of Stedman triples, lots of plain bob triples, treble bobbing on 8, 3 leads of Kent and half a course of Yorkshire.

It was great to kick off the New Year with such a varied weekend's ringing. Thank you all for your tea, biscuits and support.

Channel Islands District Outing Sat March 24th

The Channel Islands have an outing to Southampton area most years but the decision to enter a District team in the Guild 8 bell striking competition this year gave an extra impetus to tour the area — making sure we visited the venue for the competition. We were as ever very grateful for the support of our Reading friends — Kelvin Britton, June Saint, John and June Wells, Jack and Jenny Page, Monica Trow and Viv Bloundele at various stages of the outing.

Steve, Peter and I were delighted to be joined by Kelvin on Friday night – the eve of the outing. We joined New Alresford (16cwt 8). – for their practice, were made very welcome and had a good evening's ringing – plain hunt on 8 through to Cambridge Major.

On Saturday: Judy Collins and Justin Reid (from Jersey) were already over in UK and were joined by Peter Routier and David Clare (also from Jsy) and Jane le Conte (Gsy). These 5 together with Helen, Peter and Stephen make up the competition team, it was disappointing that no-one else from the Channel Islands was able to attend but it did mean we were able to ring the test piece on a good number of occasions without feeling guilty that the non-team members were being short changed.

<u>Hawkley (8cwt 8)</u> the venue for the competition – Stephen ran the ringing here kicking off with a course of our special method of the day – Diamond Delight Major. We were able to ring the test piece twice, John and June went outside and listened and were able to give some very direct feedback on the first run-through so Stephen started his tweaking of the band – managing to actually make positive use of my naturally late backstroke by putting me on a most appropriately odd struck bell.

Then we were off to Liss St Marys (8, 12cwt) where we were briefly locked-out. We tracked down a key though and only lost a little time. Peter R ran the tower and we had another go at our test piece and some Rutland & Stedman triples

<u>East Meon(18cwt 10)</u> was run by Justin. Grandsire Caters and Stedman caters and little bob royal all went well.

Our convoy driving – Steve in the lead – was now perfected – winding our way through the beautiful country lanes – admiring thatched cottages and pretty village greens we found our way to the White Lion in Soberton for an excellent lunch, from which we were able to walk to the church

<u>Soberton (13 cwt 8)</u> was run by Judy – who claimed never to have run any ringing before!! Steve was by now nearly happy with his band placing – did another little swop and we rang our piece again, more Stedman & Bristol were also rung.

2012 District AGM

The 2012 District AGM will be held at the Town Church, St Peter Port, Guernsey on Saturday 22nd September.

The judges of the six bell inter-tower striking competition will be Alan Regin & Jo Dorling from London, both members of the Cumberland Youths. Don't forget that a rule change was agreed at last year's AGM. A copy of the revised rules is attached below. Due to the difficulties of Inter-Island travel, it is likely that some ringers from outside Guernsey will travel to the island the day before, and/or stay overnight on the Saturday. There will be a Surprise Major practice at the Town Church on the Friday evening, 4.30 – 6.30pm.

Following this, an informal dinner is being arranged at Les Côtils Christian Centre, 7.30 for 8pm, to which all ringers and their partners are welcome to attend.

The Saturday will include general ringing at the Town Church in the morning, short service, lunch, meeting, striking competition, tea and competition results.

There will probably be a 10 bell quarter peal attempt at St Peter's Saturday evening. To save time at the meeting, minutes of the Sept. 2011 District AGM and the Summer meeting in June 2012 are published in this edition of "Les Clôches". They will also be circulated to all Tower contacts, together with programmes for the day, agenda for the meeting, revised competition rules and details of the proposed Friday evening meal. Remember that all District Officers are elected on an annual basis and be ready with your nominations. (A list of Guidance for District Officers was published in the Feb. 2012 issue of Les Clôches.) A new editor for Les Clôches is also needed, to replace Jenny Rains who is moving back to the UK. (Thanks Jenny for all your hard work!)

CHANNEL ISLANDS DISTRICT OF THE WINCHESTER & PORTSMOUTH GUILD OF CHURCH BELL RINGERS

STRIKING COMPETITION RULES (Revised Sept. 2011)

This will be a six-bell competition with teams representing towers to be chosen by the tower captain. Members of each team must be fully paid up members of the Guild and be a regular and active member of the Sunday Service band of the tower they represent. Where a ringer is a regular member of more than one tower, they should be allowed to ring for both bands.

- 2. Each tower may enter up to two teams of which no more than two ringers may be common to both teams. This rule may be varied at the discretion of the District Committee.
- 3. Call changes or any doubles or minor method will be allowed.
- 4. Each band must strike 120 half pulls. Scoring will commence at the first change and cease upon coming into rounds. Any changes short will incur maximum faults per change. Any changes in excess will continue to be marked and, therefore, may accumulate extra faults. Call change bands must ensure that all bells, except tenor, take an approximately equal turn at leading.
- 5. It will be assumed that open handstroke leads are intended unless the conductor informs the organisers otherwise before commencing.
- 6. Each individual ringer, on entering the tower, may pull off his bell and adjust his rope, if necessary.
- 7. Each team may practice rounds/changes for a maximum of 2 minutes and then stand.
- 8. The treble shall be rung to indicate that the team is to commence the test piece.
- 9. Scoring will be determined by the judge on the day.
- 10. The order of ringing will be decided by ballot.

1) Election of new members

All the proposed new members were elected unanimously.

2) Guild AGM Striking Competition -2012

The Guild AGM and Striking Competition were being held on Saturday, 7 July, 2012 and the Notice of, and the Agenda for, the meeting had been circulated already.

3) District Striking Competition - 2012

The District AGM and Striking Competition were being held on Saturday, 22

September, 2012 at the Town Church in Guernsey.

4) Guild AGM and Striking Competition - 2013

The 2013 Guild AGM and Striking Competition were being held on Saturday, 6 July in Jersey. The members present supported the idea of there being a dinner for the occasion and the Committee would discuss the idea and decide the appropriate arrangements to be made.

5) Proposals for changes to striking competitions

Altering the Guild's six bell striking competition from an inter tower competition to an inter district one had been suggested. The same idea was also being considered for the Guild' eight bell competitions. After discussion, the members present expressed a preference for the six bell competition to remain an inter-tower one, but would be happy if the eight bell competition remained as an inter-district one.

6) Peal and quarter peal submissions

This item was not taken.

7) Ringing for the Queen's Silver Jubilee

David Strong wished to know the names of all those involved in ringing to celebrate Queen Elizabeth's Silver Jubilee and the anniversary of her succession in February. Those present confirmed quarter peals had been rung by all towers for the Jubilee.

8) Other business

Young ringers

Mike Bubb reported on comments which had arisen from a recent meeting of young ringers. It was clear groups of ringers needed to be inclusive of ringers of all ages, both for ringing and associated events. It was agreed Sunday ringing was of consequence and a prime objective of ringing. In Guernsey recently, someone who had commenced ringing had become a full member of the congregation, been confirmed and joined the servers' rota. There was no support for the idea of teaching bell ringing to persons who would not commit to ringing for Sunday services.

Communication

There was concern at the recent poor communication from the District Committee to the members. More advance warning of events and the avoidance of alterations at short notice was requested. Mike Bubb informed the meeting that the date of this meeting had been changed from 23rd June to 16th June in January (subsequent check of his email showed it was early February)

There being no further business the meeting was closed at 11.32 a.m.

Minutes of the AGM held at St. Anne's, Alderney, 24th September 2011 at 2.15pm

Welcome and opening remarks. The Chairperson, Anne Fraser, welcomed everyone to the meeting, especially John and June Wells of Reading who were to judge the striking competition, and Michael Hopkins Till, the Guild Vice-Master, and Lucy Hopkins Till. She noted that this was a special occasion as today's meeting marked the 30th Anniversary of the formation of the Channel Island District, the first meeting having also taken place in Alderney in 1981. It was to be marked by Quarter Peal attempts in each tower, and a special cake had been made for the afternoon's tea.

Declaration of "any other business" since circulation of the agenda – 3 items had been submitted.

Apologies for Absence: Michael Bubb (Vale), Robin Pittman (St. John's), Jack Worrall (St. Mark's).

In memoriam - none

Minutes of the 2010 AGM and District meeting June 2011. These had been circulated prior to the meeting. It was proposed by Rene Batiste, seconded Anne Dorey, that these be adopted.

Matters arising (matters not on the agenda separately) :-

- a) Guild 8 bell Striking Competition. It was noted that there had not been enough interest in raising a band for this year's competition. Some discussion ensued including differing views on the construction of possible bands, and whether members would be willing to take part if they were at the Guild AGM, regardless of prior practice together, but no conclusions were made.
- b) Les Clôches. This was now being produced electronically with a few "hard" copies for those who preferred them or didn't have internet access. Comments were made that the A5 format was rather hard to read due to the small print; Peter Bevis explained that this format kept the costs down but if the original was written in a larger font than at present, it would not be so reduced when printed. Phillip Maddocks suggested at least 10 or 12 point, and a more "readable" script such as Times New Roman, be adopted. It was agreed that these suggestions be passed on to the Editor, but also thanks for her hard work in producing an excellent newsletter. Peter was also thanked for his work in printing it. It was suggested that

if A4 copies were required for individual members, their home tower should find someone to print one off or, failing that, a special request be made to Peter.

Treasurer's Report. Phillip Maddocks presented his report. He stated that membership was slightly down, but was not unduly worried by this. The deficit of £345 was a result of 2 years' judges' expenses showing up in one year. The current balance is actually 25% up on 5 years ago. However, he did feel it was time to raise subscriptions and proposed 50p per member for all except probationers. That this should take place was proposed by Mike Halsey, seconded by Ann Wheeler, and voted for unanimously.

Ringing Master's report. Helen McGregor thanked the District secretary for her support during the year. She highlighted the events that had taken place, especially the Saturday practices in Guernsey. In addition a training weekend had been organised in Reading, a Quarter Peal day held in Guernsey, and an outing "piggy-backed" onto the RW centenary celebrations in London. All these events had been fully reported in "Les Clôches".

Election of Officers. The Secretary clarified that looking back through the minutes of previous years had confirmed that the only rules pertaining to C.I. District officers were that each Island should be represented and that they be elected each year to facilitate this. Terms of office were *traditionally* 3 years but this is not statutory, nor is there a necessity to stagger the change of officers. All present officers were willing to stand for another year although Helen informed the meeting that if elected, this would be her last year as Ringing Master. Nicky might well also stand down at the end of the year. Anne was willing to stay on until after the 2013 Guild AGM. There being no other nominations, Peter Bevis proposed that the existing officers be re-elected for another year. This was seconded by Paul Arditti and carried unanimously.

Guild AGMs

- 2012 A letter had been received from the Guild Secretary asking the District to discuss whether a different programme timing of Guild AGMs would encourage more members to attend as the Master was conscious of the fact that members attending from the Island Districts on a day trip were likely to miss some of the meeting (and tea!) under the present format. A short discussion followed, but it seems unlikely that change of times would affect members' willingness to attend high travel costs were the determining factor. This information will be passed on to the Guild Executive committee.
- 2013 The Guild AGM is due to be held in our District in 2013. The District Committee had agreed that this would be hosted by Jersey. However, there are no plans to combine the meeting with a "mini Festival" as on previous occasions. The District would provide facilities as per AGMs held on the mainland, but no travel arrangements, holiday packages, or excursions would be arranged. However, if individuals chose to make their own arrangements to extend their stays, then they would be made most welcome and towers would be made available to them as far as possible in whatever island they chose to visit. This information would also be sent to the Guild Executive.
- **30**th **Birthday Quarter Peals.** The District Committee had previously suggested that a quarter peal be attempted at each tower in the district around the time of the meeting, to commemorate its 30th anniversary. Vale had already rung theirs; Alderney planned one later that day, and the other towers hoped they would soon be able to ring one. Members were requested to send the details of any Quarters rung for the occasion to be sent to the District secretary, so that they could all be sent into the "Ringing World" together, with a short report.
- **Update on Alderney bells.** Peter Bevis (Tower captain) informed those present of the plans for augmentation of Alderney's bells to eleven. A redundant bell (21cwt 7lb) has been purchased from St John's, Crawshawbooth, Manchester to provide a new tenor. Three new treble bells are to be added and one in the middle. This will result in a light front six, a heavy back six, and a middle weight eight, as well as a ten. Funding is in place without any grant from the Guild Bell restoration fund. The States of Alderney have approved the work subject to survey. A faculty has yet to be obtained. It is hoped that the work will be completed by this time next year.

Any Other Business:-

a) Change of Striking Competition rules. John David proposed that rule 2 be changed to enable all Sunday Service ringers present at a meeting who wish to take part, being allowed to do so with a minimum overlap of people. This would reduce the necessity for "scratch" teams and give every qualified ringer the opportunity to ring for their home tower. A long period of at times confused discussion followed. Peter

Bevis felt it was important that everyone should have the opportunity to take part and that it was a valuable experience to perform their best striking. Jane Le Conte reminded those present that the "two per tower" rule was made in the days when the district was more active and because of the time constraints of the meeting — too many entries could cause practical difficulties. Pam Pearson felt that allowing more than 2 ringers common to a team could give some ringers an unfair advantage of winning by having "two bites at the cherry." Eventually Paul Arditti suggested that Rule 2 be changed to "Each tower may enter up to two teams of which no more than two ringers may be common to both teams. This rule may be varied at the discretion of the District Committee". Acceptance of this was proposed by Maurice Stupart and seconded by Duncan Loweth. The motion was carried by an almost unanimous vote — there were two votes against.

- b) **District Officers' Forum.** The Chairperson gave a short description of the Guild's District officers' Forum which was set up earlier in the year by the Guild Master, David Strong. This is a group providing the opportunity to discuss ringing related matters, sharing ideas and information in a much less formal way that the Guild Executive meetings. Anne had attended the inaugural meeting in April, and was prepared to attend the next one 29th October. Two delegates are permitted to attend, ideally District Officers, but not necessarily so. She asked if anyone would like to attend or had any issues which they would like to have discussed, to contact her in the near future.
- c) **Membership Badges.** Anne Fraser reminded members that newly elected full members of the Guild were at present presented with a Guild membership certificate, paid for out of District funds. She proposed that as from today's meeting, any newly elected full members also be presented with a Guild badge, also to be funded by the District. Badges are currently £2 each. This was seconded by Nicky David and carried unanimously.

There being no other business, the meeting closed at 3.15pm.

The meeting was followed by tea which included an especially commissioned "birthday cake" made by Vale ringer, Duncan Loweth, which was cut by Chairperson, Anne Fraser. The judges of the Striking Competition, John and June Wells of Reading, then gave the results as follows:-

The Judges thanked the Committee for inviting them to judge the competition. They commented that all 9 teams had made a good effort, and completed their test piece. Ringing varied from "extremely good" to "a bit of polish needed". All bands had used their opening rounds well but most needed to practise their "pull offs". The bells themselves were a "sedate six" and hard to achieve perfect ringing on. They had both marked the faults and were looking for a good overall sound rather than a specific speed. Ultimately it had been very hard to separate the teams in the top two places and they had nearly given them a tie!

ST. ANNE'S, ALDERNEY TOWER REPORT

The first six months of 2012 have just flown by, but lots has happened in that time. Firstly we welcome June Saint, Stephen Rossiter's wife, who has finally taken the plunge and joined the W&P and the St Annes band. June is still not a frequent member of the Sunday Service band, but she is not the only member to have that particular defect and joins us as often as she can! We also welcome Aileen and Thursa, both taking the first steps towards plain hunt on six on tower bells and mastering the simpler pleasures of plain bob in hand.

The Beresford Ring is now complete, and located at the Methodist church hall. This ring comprise six Saxilby simulators in a steel frame. We have begun teaching what seems like dozens of children, most of whom will inevitably fall by the wayside. Some, however, show real talent and we can only hope. Practice night is Tuesday, from 6pm - 8pm and is combined into a mind games club, with dozens of board games available at tables, which



prove a popular distraction to those not ringing at any time, and round out the experience for the children.

The St Anne augmentation grinds slowly forward. In February, we obtained a favourable opinion from the Guernsey firm of structural engineers (selected by the church architects) on the ability of the tower to take the additional bells. Since then we have also had to comply with the less reasonable demands of The States to have the precise design of the bell frame approved by the structural engineer before starting on the process of applying for a faculty. Following a return visit by the bellhanger, the bell frame design has now been reviewed by a bemused structural engineer, who has naturally approved it, having never seen

one before. We can only wait now to see how The States can delay us further. It is over a year since I approached them for permission to apply for a faculty. A ten minute job, I naively thought. No wonder the Alderney economy is in tatters.


On the ringing front, we progress slowly, but definitely in the right direction. As Donald and Keith join the ranks of the plain hunting majority we ring less rounds on a Sunday and more plain hunt. A good thing if overall striking standards are maintained. Saturday mornings have been placed at Helen's disposal, to permit this time to return to being primarily a learners' practice. On Monday, Norwich has become a standard method, despite the almost permanent, and sad, loss of Philippa to her Scottish home. We still remain disappointingly capable of firing out a plain course of bob minor though. Ah well.

Aileen and Thursa are guinea pigs for two of my "pet theories". Firstly I suspect that learning to plain hunt using the simulator at the same time as learning to hunt by ropesight helps a learner to hear their bell in methods. As ringers who cannot hear their bells suffer from the same sort of handicap as a colour-blind painter, I believe that this is a vital skill to gain. More controversial, perhaps, is my suspicion that it may be better to learn to hunt on an even number of bells. When learning to hunt on five with a cover, learners may use the tenor as a visual crutch, instead of listening to their leads. Then, when moving on to ringing on an even number of bells, they experience the pain of having "nothing to lead off". Also, in even bell hunting, the place at the back is a right place, rather than the wrong place found in odd bell ringing.

Visitors have been rare birds indeed. Only 11 visitors over the whole period.

ST. ANNE'S, ALDERNEY QUARTERS/PEALS

We are very pleased to have rung 18 quarters in the first half of the year, compared to 9 in the same period last year. Of the tower bell quarters, 7 were of minor and 10 of doubles. The Surprise mainly comprised St Anne Ringers, whereas last year we relied heavily of visitors in order to manage quarters of surprise. Of special note was Donald Hughes' first away from cover, treble to a quarter of Bob Doubles and Jane Fraser's first inside, also Bob Doubles.



We were fortunate to have a visit by two of the Vale band, Joe and Duncan, and used the opportunity to ring some fancy spliced - London and Cambridge, Plain, Double and St Clements and Cambridge and Plain. What a pleasure it is to ring well struck spliced.
